

The National Annual Expert Witness Survey

This is the first joint Expert Witness survey conducted by Bond Solon, the UK's leading Expert Witness training company in association with *The Times* newspaper.

This survey was designed to gain a better understanding of the issues affecting expert witnesses. It was conducted online from the 30th September to 28th October 2016. Over 700 experts completed this survey making it one of the largest Expert Witness surveys ever done in the UK.

Annual Legal Update

1. Supreme Court decision in Kennedy v Cordia [2016] UKSC 6.

A decision arising from a case in Scotland which identifies the principles for deciding on the admissibility of expert witness evidence:

- (i) Will the evidence assist the court?
 - (a) Is expert evidence needed to be able to reach a decision?
 - (b) The expert must explain the basis of their evidence –" what carries weight is the reasoning, not the conclusions".
 - (c) The expert cannot usurp the functions of the judge or jury ie the judge or jury must be the ones who make the decision on the issue before them, the expert cannot decide the issue for them.
- (ii) The expert must demonstrate their knowledge and expertise; then they can refer to, and draw on, the general body of knowledge and understanding of the relevant field of expertise.
- (iii) Impartiality and other duties. A non-compliant report may be excluded, so the need for independence and impartiality is a question of admissibility, not simply of the weight to attach to the evidence.
- (iv) There must be a reliable body of knowledge and expertise. If it is an unrecognised area, evidence will be needed to show its methodology and validity.

Its application in case law:

- (i) Jones v HM Advocate [2016] HCJAC 65. The Appeal Court upheld the Sheriff's ruling that the police officer had sufficient expertise and knowledge to allow him to give evidence about the drugs and he was an independent and impartial witness.
- (ii) Deloitte LLP v Commissioners for HMRC, First Tier Tribunal17/6/16. The Tribunal ruled that parts of the report were inadmissible (eg, discussions of legal rights and obligations were matters for legal submissions, not for the expert) and redacted the report accordingly.
- (iii) Q v P [2016] Fam.L.R.54. EW evidence was not admitted, as it was not necessary for the proper resolution of the issues, nor did it assist the court. The factual elements were allowed.

2. Civil Justice Council Report on Concurrent Expert Evidence ("CEE") and implications

Published in August 2016

Identified three different types of CEE:

- (i) sequential, back to back;
- (ii) "hot tubbing" judge-led, joint examination of experts (referred to in the report as "JJEE" the hot tub is filling up with acronyms)
- (iii) variations: experts question each other or comment on each other's evidence; counsel has the opportunity fully to test the expert's views; usually, but not always, judge-led.

The "Teach in": appointment of a neutral scientific advisor, not at the trial, but giving the judge high level assistance on a number of discrete topics before the trial.

- (iii) schedules of defects
- (iv) boundary disputes
- (v) building and construction claims
